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#### 7. Narrative Description

This is a one-story, front gable, Craftsman bungalow built around 1913. It is not depicted on the 1912 Sanborn map, but it shows up in a 1914 publication. The cross gables facing south, east, and west are all clipped gables. The house sits on a concrete block foundation. The walls are wood frame, clad in wood clapboards, covered with vinyl clad aluminum siding. The hipped roof is clad with asphalt shingles.

The front, or south facing elevation, reveals a full width porch that recessed under the main building roof and has a round column at each front corner and new wrought iron railing. The columns have simple capitals and their base rests on the porch. The recessed porch wraps around part of the east elevation. The entry foyer projects onto the porch a few feet, centered on the façade. The front façade is symmetrical, with a large one-over-one-light, double-hung window on the left and right of a single entry on the porch. A historic photograph (Record Printing Company 1914: 65) shows that there was a low, spindled railing around the porch and that the area to the east of the entry was screened-in. A deep support beam that spans between the columns across the front of the building is concealed by the new vinyl siding. A set of paired thirty-six-over-one-light, double-hung windows are centered above the porch and beneath the brow of the hipped roof. Above each column at the porch corners are single, curved knee brace brackets that project out to the edge of the roof eave. These are also located under the roof on the east and west sides.

The east elevation shows that the porch wraps around the building and is supported by a third column. Several small, fixed windows are seen on this part of the porch. A single entry to the upper level is located above the porch on this side and under the brow of the projected side clipped gable. A wood access stairway to this entry is seen on the east side of the building. The east elevation also shows a one-over-one-light, double-hung window on the right on the first story.

The west elevation shows a side view of an enclosed back porch on the left, followed by two small, one-over-one-light, double-hung windows and then a set of four, paired one-over-one-light, double-hung windows on the side of the rear section. On the side of the main house, there are three one-over-one-light, double-hung windows below the side clipped gable. One is located on the upper story and two on the first story. A small fixed window is also on the upper level.

The rear elevation shows a single one-over-one-light, double-hung window on the left of the first story. On the right is seen a small back porch with single entry. The porch is enclosed with small, one-over-one-light, double-hung windows. A hipped dormer with two small one-over-one-light, double-hung windows is seen on this elevation.

According to the Sanborn maps, the lot at 405 West 4<sup>th</sup> Street was empty in 1912. The house appears in the 1919 map in it's present configuration, except that a small back porch is shown and there is no garage. A garage is shown on the 1928 map at the northwest corner of the property and the back porch is enclosed by that time. The present garage appears to be the one constructed in the 1920s. It has a

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concrete foundation, wood frame with board and batten cladding on the walls, and a gambrel roof with asphalt shingles. While two windows have been filled in with plywood in recent years, there are two single, four-over-four-light, double-hung windows on the upper level. The garage is accessed from the front of the property, with a driveway along the west side of the house.

#### 8. Narrative Statement of Significance

The Chester Lillibridge House does not appear to be individually eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A, B, or C. However, it does appear to be a contributing building in a potential "West Hill" neighborhood historic district.

This house has sheltered notable families and individuals since it was built in 1913. Some of the occupants were locally prominent, while others were hard working, middle class, Muscatine citizens. Chester Lillibridge was in his 60s when building and moving to this house. There were no owners or occupants that were significant through their life's work while living in this house. Also, this house does not appear to be associated with historic events in Muscatine. This house was designed and built well in 1913 and has maintained it's architectural integrity, even though there has been modifications to the building in recent years, such as the upper level entry and access stair on the east side, and the addition of aluminum siding and the replacement of the porch railing. These modifications appear to make this house ineligible for individual consideration under Criteria C. Even though this house looks like a house built by Huttig Manufacturing, there is no evidence that it is. Thus, the Chester Lillibridge House does not appear to be individually eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A, B, or C.

However, the Chester Lillibridge House does appear to be a contributing building in a potential "West Hill" neighborhood historic district. This is a rather spacious Craftsman style house that is flanked by similar Craftsman style houses of the early 20<sup>th</sup> Century. The Lillibridge House has retained much of the appeal of the photo published in 1914, and therefore contributes to its immediate neighbors, as well as to the potential "West Hill" neighborhood historic district.

This house was likely built by Chester Lillibridge in 1913. The house does not appear on the 1912 Sanborn map, but a photo of it is seen in the 1914 publication. (Record Printing Company 1914: 65). On November 29, 1910, Chester Lillibridge bought this property from J.D. Blanck (Lots Book 43, page 164). The Lillibridge family is shown to be occupying this house in city directories from 1913 through 1924. Chester Lillibridge was born in Bloomington Township, Muscatine County on October 7, 1844 to Amos and Amanda M. (Beardsley) Lillibridge. Chester married Mary C. Jackson on October 16, 1872. They had four children: Cora, Ralph, Bert and Edwin. Mr. Lillibridge initially worked at the J.A. Bishop grocery as a retail clerk; then formed a partnership with W. Beardsley in the grocery business. A year later he became a partner with J.A. Bishop in a store until 1871 when he sold out and in the fall of that year bought into the grocery business with James Jackson. He partnered with Mr. Jackson until 1884, when Lillibridge bought out Jackson and partnered with James H. St. John (*Portrait and Biographical Album of Muscatine County, Iowa*, 1889: 273). In 1890, he became a director of the Muscatine Bridge Company,

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selling stock to finance the construction of the first bridge to span the Mississippi River at Muscatine. He also undertook the selling of bonds to finance other public works projects, such as levees, bridges and toll roads. He also became a director of the Hershey State Bank. It appears that he also maintained ownership of his grocery building as well as farming a large tract of land in Rock Island County, Illinois (Richman 1911, Vol 2: 568). According to city directories from 1891 to 1919, Mr. Lillibridge was superintendent and treasurer of the Muscatine Bridge Company. The 1921 city directory lists him as retired. The 1920 Census shows that Mr. Lillibridge (75) was living at 405 West 4<sup>th</sup> Street with his wife Mary (71) and daughter Cora Lilly, widow (45) and her son, Chester (23). Chester Lillibridge died on June 3, 1923 ("Was One of Group Who Built Bridge", Davenport Democrat obituary, June 4, 1923, 10). His wife lived here for a few years more. She is listed at this address in the 1923-24 city directory as a widow. The 1927 city directory indicates that A.C. Adams and his wife, Adele lived here and appear to be renters. He was treasurer and manager of the U.S. Button Company.

The property was sold to Mary Thiesen on August 9, 1928 (Lots Book 68, page 484). Mrs. Thiesen then sold it to Hattie Kane after Mr. Thiesen died. The deed transfer took place on January 17, 1930 (Lots Book 72, page 300). Neither Mary Thiesen nor Hattie Kane lived at this address. H.L. Tucker and his wife Gladys were the next renters, listed in 1929. Then, Howard L. and Florence Kelly were renters. He was an insurance agent. Russell A. and Edith Mitchell are listed at 405 West 4th Street from 1934 until 1949. Mr. Mitchell was a vice president and later the general manager of the Barry Pulley Company, according to the city directories. Mr. Mitchell died on September 14, 1958 in Davenport, Iowa. (Obituaries From the Muscatine Journal, page 84)

The property was sold to Fred W. and Jennie Hoefflin on March 22, 1946. (Deeds / Abstract, Book 115, page 206. Fred Hoefflin died in November 1947. The property was passed on to Jennie Hoefflin, who further passed it to her daughter and her husband, Lucile J. and Glenn L. Pringle on December 6, 1949. The Hoefflins and the Pringles were residents of Muscatine, but not at 405 West 4<sup>th</sup> Street. The Mitchells continued to live here through this period.

On November 19, 1951, Glenn L. Pringle sold the property to William Reesink (Lots book 145, page 8). Mr. Reesink was born on July 6, 1883 in Muscatine. He married Ella Van Gent on January 1, 1908 in Muscatine. They had one son, George and two daughters, Ruth and Jennie ("William Reesink", Muscatine Journal obituary, March 18, 1969, 2). William Reesink is listed as a sash worker at Musser Co. in the 1902 and 1904 city directories. He appears to have taken up farming at about that time. He is next listed in the city directories as a farmer in the 1954 through 1959 editions.


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### Plans of buildings on site (from assessor's office)
