

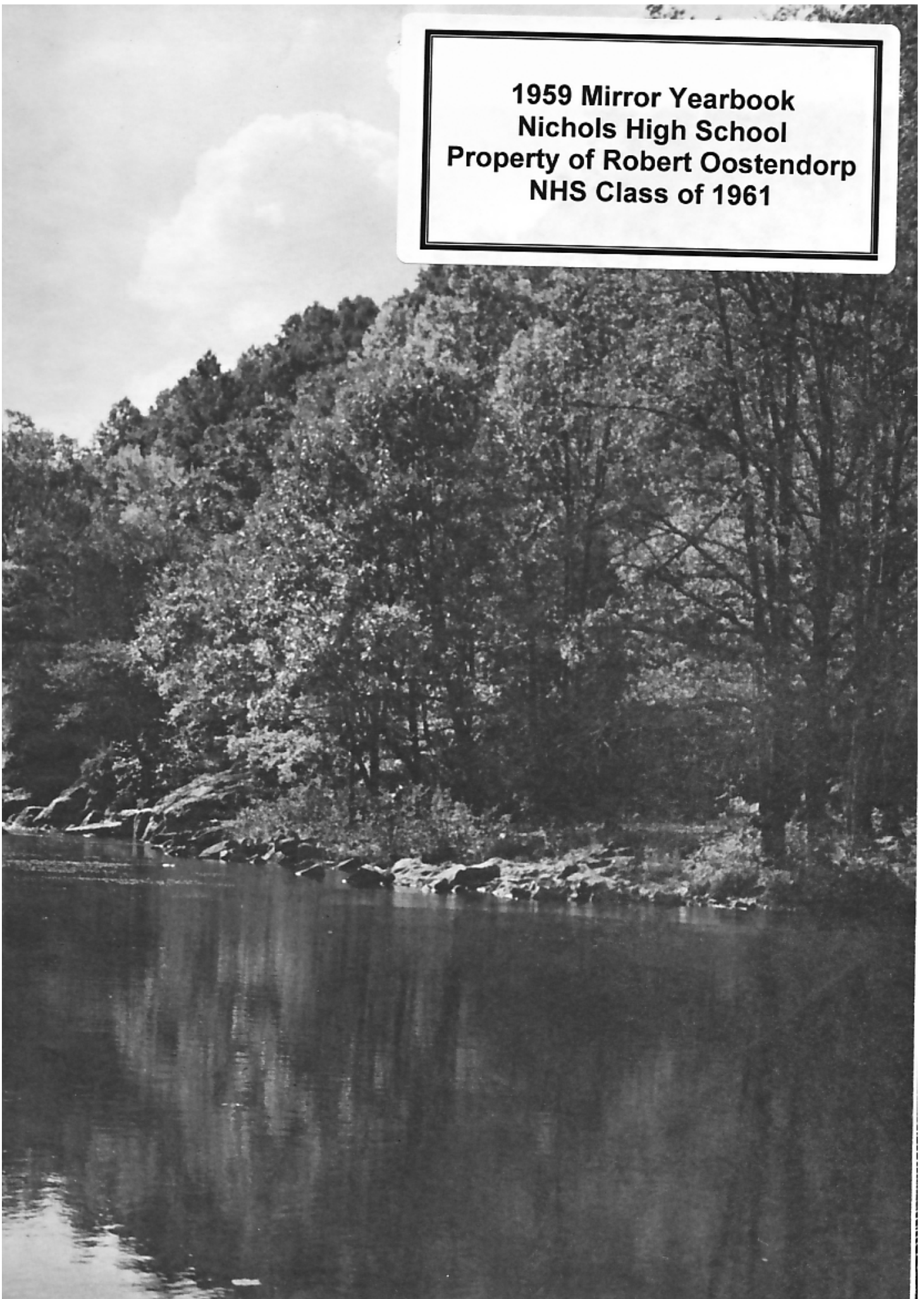

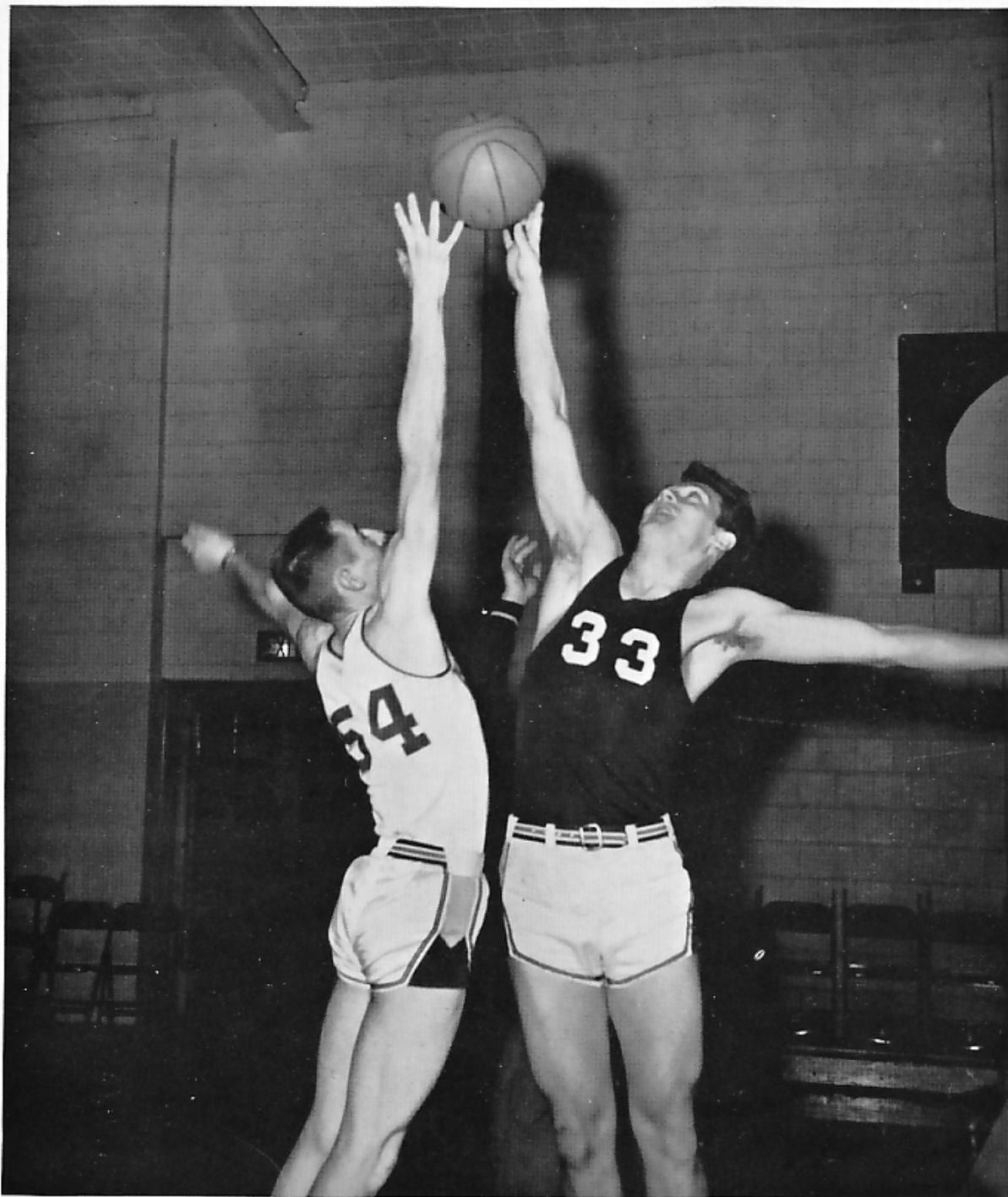


FOREWORD

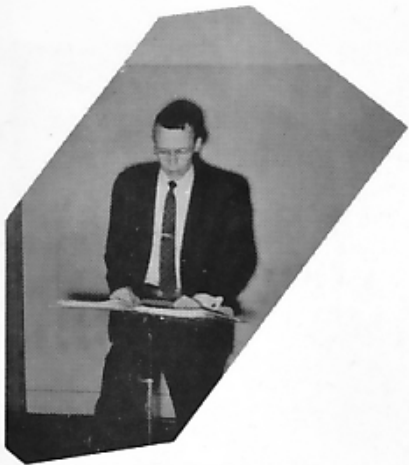
I wish you the best of success and luck in all your undertaings during the trying times and on the difficult road that leads to success.

To climax our efforts of fund raising our class took a class trip the third week in May of 1959. It was a real reward for all the hard work that went into raising money for it.

That year we chose our class colors, motto and flower. Campus blue and white became our class colors with the carnation as our flower. "The higher we climb, the broader the view" was chosen as the senior class motto for us to remember and guide us through life.

To end our high school days came baccalaureate and commencement. Baccalaureate was held at the Methodist Church with Reverend Bolinger presenting the sermon.

The final end came on May 27, the night of our high school commencement. As each of us took our diplomas and walked back to our chairs we realized it was the beginning and the end, the beginning of facing the world in our own small way and the end of thirteen years filled with much hard work to make the grade in school and lots of fun we'll always remember.
